THE SEASON

Occasionally during the growing season there is some issue or challenge that presents itself to the potato industry that catches the attention of those outside of the industry. This year the issue was the lack of rain during the summer. We had several calls from the media during the months of July and August seeking comments about how disastrous this was going to be for our industry. We explained that we still had a long time to go before the crop was harvested and that we needed to wait until the crop was in before we could assess the effect that the weather had on the crop. It seems that human nature is interested in misery more than success. We never were contacted after harvest to check on how things turned out. The effects on the crop were different depending on what part of the state you were in. Some growers suffered significant yield reductions while others were blessed with excellent yields. The overall impact of the dry summer on the industry was a slightly less than average yield with excellent quality potatoes going into storage.

The challenges faced by our industry sometimes attract the attention of those outside the industry, but more often they do not. Growers face circumstances regularly that impact their businesses and futures that often go unnoticed by the public. Things like overproduction in other parts of the country, legislative action or inaction, disease pressure, variable costs of crop inputs, changing markets and the list goes on. Potato growers in Maine know that there are many things beyond their control that affect their profitability and even their existence, but yet they still choose to grow potatoes. They still get excited when their children express an interest in farming, and there is still nothing quite like the smell of the ground being worked for the first time in the spring.

In spite of the challenges, concerns, issues and circumstances facing our industry, weather known or unknown this industry will continue. It will continue because those who are involved in it love it. Growing potatoes in Maine has more to do with family, faith, determination, attitude and satisfaction with results than worrying about those things you cannot change.




MAINE PRODUCTION BY UTILIZATION




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CASH RECEIPTS AND MAINE POTATO PRODUCTION









MAINE POTATO DISTRIBUTION: TABLESTOCK

TABLESTOCK SHIPMENTS


HISTORICAL 2003 - 2012



MAINE TABLESTOCK DISTRIBUTION 2011 - 2012




TABLESTOCK SHIPMENTS 2011 - 2012



MAINE SEED DISTRIBUTION 2011 - 2012




TOP IO SEED DESTINATIONS 2011 - 2012


